2. What was the name of the killer whale at the centre of the Seaworld controversy and featured in a documentary Blackfish?	Tilikum was a male Orca captured in Iceland in 1983. Tilikum was featured in a 2013 documentary, Blackfish. He was involved in 3 fatal attacks.
3. Which of these is another name for the medical condition Hypertrichosis?	Hypertrichosis or Werewolf Syndrome causes excessive hair growth anywhere on a person's body. It can affect both sexes but is extremely rare.
